April 8 - "The Right to Go to Hell" by Jim McCollum. 70 years ago, on March 8, 1948, the U.S. Supreme Court handed down an 8-1 decision in favor of Vashti McCollum vs. the Board of Education of Champaign, Illinois. Mrs. McCollum, an atheist, objected to so-called "voluntary" classes in religious instruction in her young son James's elementary school. She objected on the grounds that they were not only inappropriate for public school, but also that they were not voluntary at all, considering that the children who did not wish to participate were ostracized by their peers and even coerced by their teachers to attend. Justice Hugo Black wrote the majority opinion, and the American Unitarian Association was one of several religious groups supporting the decision. We are honored to welcome Jim McCollum to our pulpit today to talk about this historic decision, still all too timely in many ways, from the eyes of the child at the center of it.

REsources for REsistance

"Our Unitarian Universalist communion shares roots in all of our springtime celebrations. and in our own history of struggle for religious freedom."

Spring is here...it finally, maybe, really is here, and on Easter morning, as in many of the congregations of the Christian church where we have our roots, we will celebrate communion. As in many of those churches as well, ours is an open table, open to all – all religious paths and none, all ages, all people. As the name suggests, our communion celebrates our community.

At this time of year, we as Unitarian Universalists honor the holidays of three traditions we embrace as a part of our history and as a part of our faith now, through that sentiment is echoed by many members of our conour six sources: The word Easter comes from the Earth-Based celebration of the Goddess Ostara, who felt guilty one year when she was late bringing back the spring, and so she brought back to life a poor, frozen bird, only she could not restore his gift of flight, so she made him a lightning fast rabbit, who could still lay eggs, if only once a year. Modern Pagans celebrate her holiday as one of their Sabbats, which usually includes a ritual meal of cakes and ale.

The Jewish celebration of Passover honors the journey of Moses and the Israelites from slavery in Egypt to the Promised Land. The journey is celebrated each year in Jewish households and congregations with a ritual meal known as the Seder.

as ritualized and structured as the Seder, the Last Supper he ate with his disciples was the Passover Meal. When we look for the common thread here, we find the idea of new life, whether it's new life coming up from the Earth, a new life of freedom in the Promised Land, or the new life promised in the resurrection of Christ, which our Universalist forebears maintained was meant for all, regardless of belief or lack thereof. However we may celebrate, and whatever ideas we may have about all the stories, we see them played out in nature and in our own lives, every day and every year. In some way or another, we must all experience ends that bring new beginnings, and leave behind an old life for the freedom of a new one, even when that is not an easy thing to do.

In present day America, the people so valiantly try-

ing to lead us to a new life of freedom are our youth. Refusing to let death have the final word, they are marching, organizing, and soon they will be voting for their very lives, and the lives of all young people, who are sick and tired of the death toll not only from mass shootings, but from the day-to-day brutality of gun violence in cities where that has become the norm. I could not be more proud of Ash McLain and his companions who organized and spoke at the recent March for Our Lives, and I know gregation who were there that day.

So, our Unitarian Universalist communion shares roots in all of our springtime celebrations, and in our own history of struggle for religious freedom. Our Flaming Chalice has its deepest roots in that struggle and in the celebration of communion. The original chalice symbol, first designed by Hans Deutsch for the Unitarian Service Committee, was inspired by the early Czech Christian reformer, Jan Hus. Hus spoke out in defense of an open communion table, in a time when communion was only for the priests and such protestations were cause for execution. The Flaming Chalice became a symbol of his movement...the chalice for the communion ritual he sought to open to all, and the flame to honor those who Jesus himself was a Jew, and though probably not yet had lost their lives at the stake in the cause of religious reform. Much later, in the 20th century, the chalice lived into its legacy of freedom as a symbol stamped onto forged passports to help Jews and other refugees escape Germany and other nations in the grip of the Third Reich. We can honor our Jewish, Christian, and Earth-based Sources and the power of their stories as we celebrate our own evolving, Living Tradition.
