REsources for the REsistance

Shreveport-Bossier OWL: A Social Justice Ministry

All Souls is proud to be partnering with the local chapter of the National Organization for Women (NOW) in the newly formed non-profit, Shreveport-Bossier OWL (Our Whole Lives), for the purpose of providing quality comprehensive sexuality education for the youth of Shreveport-Bossier. Our first class, currently running and serving youth within and outside the church, is for 10th-12th graders, but there are levels of OWL at every stage of the lifespan, providing accurate and age-appropriate information for K-1, 4th-6th Grade, 7th-9th Grade, 10th-12th Grade, Young Adult, Adult, and soon, Older Adult. Next year, we plan to offer the 7th-9th grade level, and to continue to increase our offerings as we train more facilitators at every level. We are grateful to the six NOW members who have been trained and currently serve as facilitators, along with our own Steve Caldwell.: Kris Holland, Melissa Wilkerson, Katherine Harper, Elizabeth Hadwin, Khristina Hall, and Debbie Hollis, who also serves as administrator of the non-profit and whose energy and commitment made this dream possible in the first place.

Our Whole Lives is a comprehensive sexuality education curriculum developed jointly by the Unitarian Universalist Association and the United Church of Christ. It can be taught in a religious setting of either of those faith traditions, but it is also designed to be taught in a secular setting, and is even used in some more progressive public school systems throughout the nation. Sadly, that is NOT true in Louisiana, where "abstinence only" sex ed is all that is allowed, as our state continues to lead or come close to leading the nation in teen pregnancy, poor maternal health outcomes, and STDs. These are just three of many reasons why OWL is so essential to our community. Another reason is to teach our young people about their own inherent worth and dignity, particularly as it relates to bodily autonomy and the issue of consent. In this season of our church year where we focus on Peace, Social Justice, and the Interdependent Web, OWL is well worth lifting up as a social justice ministry.

Along those lines, I am often in search of additional resources for our parents and youth to reinforce concepts taught in OWL, and this week I discovered an excellent one: a special episode of my favorite radio show, "Snap Judgment," that is also an episode of the podcast, "Reckonings." The podcast is the story of two people who come to grips with a sexual assault and move past it in a way that could help—that already has helped—many others, and could potentially help many more. The two people are the perpetrator and the victim, and it happened while they were freshmen in college. They each tell their side of the story, and it's a compelling look at a young man who didn't understand at the time what explicit consent really means, and suffered from a bad case of male entitlement; and a young woman who really didn't understand that she had a right to either an enthusiastic "yes" or a firm "no," and no obligation to do anything if she wasn't sure. It was the kind of murky, disturbing encounter that in a pre "metoo" world many would have shrugged off as a "bad date," but both parties come to realize it really was a sexual assault. How they both go forward from there is the most amazing part of the story, and though it is disturbing and explicit, it is a story that everyone of high school age and older should hear. I encourage parents of high school youth to listen first, and then to listen with your youth.

The young man's initial take on the incident goes a long way toward explaining the whole debacle surrounding the Kavanaugh hearings, and the young woman's initial conflicted feelings may clarify your thinking if, after all the recent news, you are still one of those people who asks, "If it really happened, why didn't she report it right then?" 
