MAY SERVICES

Worship Service starts at 11 a.m.

Children and Youth are dismissed during the service for Religious Education. Nursery care is available during Adult RE (9:15 a.m.) and till the service ends.

May 1—“Righteous Among the Nations” This is the distinction bestowed posthumously by Yad Vashem, the World Holocaust Remembrance Center, upon Waitstill and Martha Sharp for their work with the Unitarian Service Committee. The Sharps arranged safe passage for Jewish refugees out of Third Reich countries. On this day of Shreveport’s own Holocaust Remembrance service, Religious Education Director Susan Caldwell will tell their story and look at what they have to teach us about our connection to all life in the interdependent web. *Board Persons of the Day are Bob Jordan and Ken Peterson.*

May 8—“Mothering in the Second Half of Life” For Mother’s Day, hospice social worker **Sarah Boswell** is in the pulpit, exploring four characteristics that are helpful when caring for loved ones near the end of life. *Board Persons of the Day are Jocelyn Lanham and Kathy Osuch.*

May 15—Our annual presentation of the **Ralph Waldo Emerson Award**, given annually to the individual or organization from the wider community that best embodies the values and Principles of liberal religion. This year, the award goes to **Rev. Support Survivors of Sexual Exploitation

Sex trafficking happens in our community.

FREE: The Coalition to End Human Trafficking in Northwest Louisiana is partnering with local organizations and law enforcement to serve survivors of sexual exploitation and those who are at-risk.

Often, when these agencies come in contact with survivors, they are lacking in basic necessities, such as clothing and food. Packing a “go-bag” for advocates and law enforcement to bring to individuals who are rescued out of human trafficking or even arrested for prostitution-related charges is one way to help meet those needs. It is also an opportunity to foster a sense of dignity and respect during a difficult time in someone’s journey.

FROM THE MINISTER

'True Empowerment Seeks Only to Similarly Empower'

"True empowerment seeks only to similarly empower."

My friend shared this thought with me and it has been on my mind intermittently since then.

I look at what kind of power I think I have—this aging, white, female cancer veteran.

You may know the joke: Being a Unitarian (not necessarily Universalist) Minister is attempting to serve as an authority for a group of people with authority issues.

That may or may not be funny, but I do very much recognize that the power in our congregation rests with you, the members.

Even in getting older and having weathered a health challenge that left me looking a little odder on the other side—what power I have in my world is uncommon compared with the majority of people on the planet.

As I commented recently in a Sunday service, if people have the means to get to our building on a Sunday, they have more options that a whole lot of people around us.

I get it that I have the benefit of white privilege.

I get it that I have enjoyed middle class spoils.

I understand that the circumstances in which I grew up—my protected childhood, family environment, and the education afforded me—were all exceptional blessings. Trying to extend those things to others we do our social justice and action work with Northern and Central Louisiana Interfaith, Highland Center Ministries, and the other organizations with which each of us affiliates, participates, and donates.

But as the minister of All Souls Unitarian Universalist Church in Shreveport what I actually feel empowered to do is share my truth with you, share my faith journey as it is unfolding.

I have no illusions of being "the moon," but I do feel empowered to try to be a "finger pointing at the moon."

Many of you have more degrees and broader life experience than I. I am not the smartest, the most clever, the quickest, most entertaining, most nurturing, or most charismatic person in our congregation. All of those titles also rest among you, the members. I am simply the one you have elected to point more frequently.

What I endeavor to do with all my pointing is empower you any way I can to encounter every meaningful spiritual experience

I have had or that you might otherwise find.

I would love nothing more than for each of you to enjoy the comfort and assurance that rests deep within me as a matter of faith.

I find it to be dynamic and connected to something far greater than the boundaries of my personhood—something whose impact and sway are noticeable. Mine is faith that can see Theodore Parker's statement manifesting even in light of things that would seem contrary:

"I do not pretend to understand the moral universe; the arc is a long one, my eye reaches but little ways; I cannot calculate the curve and complete the figure by the experience of sight; I can divine it by conscience. And from what I see I am sure it bends towards justice."

I cannot determine who might receive what I extend or how it might be received. I shall continue, however, to the best of my ability to give it away.

And then I ask you what is your power? Are you trying to similarly empower others as your equal?

That just may be the identifiable mark of genuine empowerment.

The intent of the meals is to serve individuals and families who may “fall through the cracks” of social services. Currently, more than 120 meals are being served each Thursday.


Volunteers are needed to host tables, serve, and help in several other capacities—but the cooking is already done.

Many organizations near and dear to members of All Souls are participating, including Volunteers for Youth Justice, Hope Connections, Shreveport Symphony, Shreveport Opera, Robinson's Rescue, etc. Additionally, All Souls as a congregation is a member institution to two participating non-profits, the Highland Center Ministries and Northern and Central Louisiana Interfaith.

The Highland Center Ministries partnership of congregations began with its first project, the Highland Blessing Dinner. As many regular volunteers know, the Highland Bless-

ing Dinner is a weekly sit-down, family-style dinner served to anyone who comes to the door of the Highland Center every Thursday evening.

The partnership now supports clothing closets, free tax preparation service, summer swimming lessons for children, and a partnership with Pelican State Credit Union to provide low-cost loans and banking services to the unbanked and underbanked, keeping more of our citizens away from the doors of the payday lenders.
