An Effective RE Program Needs Everyone

The REwards of REtirement

When I first came to All Souls as a new member, our family joined the church on New Year's Eve of 1995, and I taught my first religious education class in the fall of 1996. As a parent of a child in the program, I felt called to express my sense of ownership in that way, and also, I already knew from my experience in our South Dakota congregation that I loved it, and that I learned so much about my Unitarian Universalist faith when I taught it.

My very first teaching partner was John Rosser, who was already well into his 70s, if not 80s, and was retired and looking for ways to contribute to his church.

During that same era, in the early 2000s, the late Margaret Hurley not only taught RE classes regularly, but also trained for and taught the Our Whole Lives Comprehensive Sexuality Education class for two sessions. She, too, was in her 70s at the time.

As a parent of young, growing children, I was so grateful to Margaret, John, and others who used that time in their lives to give to the children and youth of All Souls, even as they were still involved with many other projects in the community. (Margaret continued working for the MLK Health Clinic for years, and John participated in the Senior Olympics and had his house designated as a Haven House through Community Renewal).

I remember not only the gift of wise teaching partners, but also the gift, as a young parent, of the break that I got when they were teaching classes and I wasn't. Don't get me wrong, I LOVED teaching, as I know many of our young parents today do as well, but I also loved the chance to be in the service and to be fed spiritually when the Wise Ones were willing to impart their love and wisdom to the children and youth.

I see you, active retirees, and I see YOU, tired parents. To run an effective RE program, we need you all.

While there may be a tendency, especially among those of you with children who grew up in the church, to think, "Been there, done that," I am asking you to think back and remember: When your children were going through RE, did some of the older members step up to teach your children? And wasn't that a wonderful feeling, to go to service knowing they were well cared for and learning? Wouldn't you love to give someone else the gift of that experience? And if that wasn't your experience, and you had to carry it all on your own, wouldn't you love for someone else NOT to have to go through that experience? I have plenty of openings in the schedule for the

rest of the year. Please talk to me about where you might fit in. And thanks.

Holiday Conversations

The holidays are coming, and at this time of year, new and not-so-new Unitarian Universalists are often facing visits with loved ones who may be much more conservative in their religious belief and practice. If you are facing such a situation, you may be wondering how to handle conversations with family members in a way that allows you to speak your truth without damaging family harmony.

First, know that the amount of disclosure is completely up to you. I often tell Unitarian Universalist youth and adults that, faced with the question, "Are you saved?" we can absolutely truthfully answer with a simple, "Yes." That is the bedrock foundation of our Universalist stream, from the early Universalists who believed that if Jesus came to save anyone, he came to save everyone, to our present-day Universalist thinking that no one has to be separate from Love, period, and that any such separation is an illusion that either we have created for ourselves, or others have created in such a cruel way that at some point we came to believe it.

If, on the other hand, you feel this is a family member with whom you can go deeper and honestly discuss your differences, I would begin with the foundational principle of Unitarianism, that God is One, that the Source of All, by whatever name we call it, is one Source. The beautiful thing about this concept is that it can hold true whether you are a theist, an atheist, an agnostic, or anything along the beautiful spectrum in between.

Whatever our differences, we can find common ground in the idea that we come from One Source and that we come together in community to celebrate it.

To "worship" is to lift up and celebrate matters of worth, and though our matters of worth may be vastly different even within our own community, we find common ground in acknowledging that To Be Here is a miracle.

And now you are thinking, "That language is way too out there for my Aunt Susie." Remember the Universal Translator? How can you listen to Aunt Susie and hear language that is meaningful for you? How can you speak to her in language that she might find meaningful? And maybe the even more important question: When is Aunt Susie ready for an honest discussion of your differences and when is discretion the better part of valor? When would it be better to pivot to a discussion of her recipe for cornbread dressing or the identity of all those people in the old photo album. Aunt Susie, too, is a part of the interdependent web. You just may sometimes have to work a little harder to preserve that thread.
