Our future will be built in large measure on what the participants dis-



New PBS Documentary Features Famous UUs

I don't write too many columns encouraging you to watch television. Much as I might love *The Walking* Dead or Game of Thrones, when I think of you and your families, I usually like to provide you with ideas and resources that either take you and your children away from screens or at least engage you in some interactive way.

On September 20, however, I want to make an exception, and encourage you to watch the new documentary by Ken Burns, Defying the Nazis: The Sharps' War, which debuts on PBS.

The filmmaker, already so well known for documentaries from The Civil War to The Central Park Five, and many more, has turned his attention to a story well known to many Unitarian Universalists, and one that has been dear to my own heart for many years.

You may have heard me preach on their story on Holocaust Memorial Sunday last May. Rev. Waitstill Sharp and his wife Martha remain two of only five Americans named as Righteous Among the Nations on the wall at Yad Vashem, the Holocaust memorial museum and educational center in Jerusalem. The Righteous were non-Jews who risked their lives to save Jews with no material benefit to themselves in return.

Waitstill Sharp was a Unitarian parish minister in Wellesley, Massachusetts, where he and his wife Martha were raising their two children when they were first asked (Continued on Page 5: to serve the Unitarian Service Committee in Prague,

Czechoslovakia.

Although Rev. Sharp had spoken from his pulpit in favor of U.S. intervention in the rapidly growing European refugee crisis, an unpopular position in the still very isolationist United States of 1939, he and Martha had never had the kind of experience they would come to need as they rescued more than 2,000 adults and children from all over Europe, first from Prague, and later from their USC office in Lisbon, Portugal. The couple made it up as they went along.

The Sharps' is a story that plays out like a novel of international espionage, and yet the danger to them was all too real, and constant for the duration of their time in Europe.

"What is it in a human being that gives up what is comfortable, safe, and familiar for that which is not only uncomfortable, but dangerous and lifethreatening? "Who are we," is the animating question in the work I try to do, and this is a story that woke me up. I think what is so wonderful is that it touches on religious faith in the United States, on the evil of the Holocaust and the monstrous Nazi regime. This intersects with that, and with the role of government, and [the question of what is the responsibility of individual citizens? How individuals can stand up against regimes as brutal as the Nazis? A minister and his wife. they figured out how to write in code, they figured out smuggling human lives, they figured out how to get past Nazi guards. This is not something

they teach you in Divinity School."

Invited guests include Governor John Bel Edwards*, Shreveport Mayor Ollie Tyler, Caddo commissioners, and other elected officials. The meeting will discuss the following issues:

Workforce Development— According to a United Way Study, 40 percent of Bossier City working families do not make enough money to buy basic necessities. The number is 47 percent in Shreveport. However, Louisiana Technical College states there are 17,600 living-wage jobs going unfilled.

Interfaith has a program model that addresses employers' needs and upgrades the skills of the working poor. In other areas where this program exists, the areas have an 81percent completion rate of moving low-wage workers into these jobs.

Public Safety—Interfaith leaders are taking a proactive stance to address crime and violence in our communities. We stand with our sister organizations in Baton Rouge and Dallas in their time of grief.

We would also like to see community-oriented policing expand in Shreveport and develop in Bossier City.

Industrial Tax Exemption—

Governor Edwards signed an executive order reforming the way companies are granted exemptions for paying local property taxes.

Volunteers for Youth Justice Promote CASA for LGBTQ Youth

A Court-Appointed Special Advocate (CASA) is a volunteer specially trained and supervised and appointed by a judge to speak up for a child or youth in foster care.

CASA volunteers help to secure safe and permanent homes for abused and neglected children by assisting with the investigation and monitoring of cases involving those youth.

The advantage to the child of having a CASA volunteer is that the volunteer is a consistent presence throughout their experience in foster care, while the court principals may change in various stages of the process.

After the church service on September 11, All Souls will host a presentation by CASA Program Director Stacy Eppers from Volunteers for Youth Justice. She will speak to us about the current very pressing need for CASA volunteers willing to work with LGBTQ youth, as they often have trouble finding people in this area who have the best interests of these particular children and youth at heart.

If the scheduling seems lastminute, we realize that it is, but the CASA training is coming up very soon, so we are hoping that some of you will be interested, willing, and able to volunteer. Do come and learn more about it, at any rate!


UCBR continues to provide support, such as free child care and meals, to those assisting with the rebuilding efforts.

New UUA 'Common Read' Announced

Unitarian Universalists were electrified at General Assembly 2016 by Rev. Dr. William J. Barber II's call for building and sustaining a movement for justice for all people. The UUA Common Read selection committee believes that this is a moment for Unitarian Universalists to answer that call.

The Third Reconstruction offers helpful, practical guidance for engaging with justice movements born in response to local experiences of larger injustices. Drawing on the prophetic traditions of the Jewish and Christian scriptures, while making room for other sources of truth, the book challenges us to ground our justice work in moral dissent, even when there is no reasonable expectation of political success, and to do the hard work of coalition building in a society that is fractured and polarized.

Rev. Barber said recently during his speech at the Democratic National Convention, "Some issues are not left versus right, or liberal versus conservative, they are right versus wrong." Check out Rev. Barber's full speech from the DNC on YouTube.




Up Your UU Game by Teaching RE for Children and Youth

What's wrong with this picture?

As you are probably aware, the regular Religious Education year began on August 21. I'm grateful that for now, with subs and backups, I have the full contingent of teachers. However, as I write this, we are coming up on **Jax Schmidt**'s last Sunday as a sub in the Pre-K-1st class, so we will need someone to step in there with **Diane Bundy**.

Diane is very experienced with this age group, so if you haven't taught an RE class before, this is a great chance for you to step in and get that experience, partnering with someone who knows the routine and knows the kids!



Along those same lines, we have **Jocelyn Lanham** in the 2nd -5th class and **Noah Wagstaff** in the Middle School/High School class, both of whom have worked with their respective classes extensively and both of whom have signed up for the entire year! So in those two classes, also, there are excellent opportunities for learning in partnership.

With our Pre-K/K- 1 class, we need a second teacher for this pillar and then will need teachers for the pillars that come after the New Year: World Religions (January 8 through February 19); Peace, Social Justice, and the Interdependent Web (February 26 – April 9), and Personal Spiritual Growth and Development (April 16 – May 28). For each pillar, the last date is an intergenerational service in which the class participates.

When you teach RE, you get a curriculum you can use either "Cookbook" style, following lessons to the letter, or as a guideline to add your own creativity to reinforce the points of the lessons.

From so many people who have taught over the years, I hear, "I learned so much about Unitarian Universalism!" As the saying goes, "We teach what we most need to learn."

Another advantage is that you get to know the children and youth and help build greater intergenerational cohesiveness in our congregation. So if you have been a member or actively attending friend of the church for six months or longer, please take this opportunity to help raise our children in the faith.
