# All Souls Bids Farewell to

# Hazel Martin

We are deeply saddened to mark the passing of an era at All Souls. Hazel Martin passed away on Sunday, March 10, in Raleigh, North Carolina. In our sadness, we also feel deep gratitude for all she has meant to our congregation. Although she joined the church before there was a membership book or a database, her best guess was that she had joined in 1975, though it may have been earlier than that.



Throughout the years, Hazel was an active, supportive, and pivotal part of the All Souls community. For years she was a regular Religious Education teacher, and in 1994 was one of the teachers who collaborated on the beautiful quilt that now hangs in the office. She was also an active Unitarian Universalist at the district level, and for a number of years attended the Southwest UU Summer Institute (SWUUSI, now The Point) as well as several General Assemblies. She was an ardent feminist, a staunch defender of LGBTQ rights, and a politically active progressive. A teacher by profession and a lifetime learner, in early 2000, Hazel pioneered the Eastern Religions Group, which later became the Book Group, which later became the Great Questions Group, which later became the Ted Talks Group, which finally became the Tuesday Night Discussion Group.



For as long as she was able, Hazel hosted the group in her home and it was one of her great joys. She was also a devoted member of the Sisters of Miriam during the years that that women's group was active, and she participated in Sunday worship, the Brown Bag Discussion group and other Adult RE offerings for as long as she was able to come up to the church. She loved live music, and often showed up at the Noble

Savage or

anywhere that Barbara, Bob Jordan, or any of her favor-All Souls musicians were playing. When she was no longer able to get to church, the discussion group continued to meet in her home, and, along with Hazel's son Chris, were a big part of helping her remain in her home for as long as she was able to do so.

Hazel's sons, Chris, Larry, and Noel ("Bud") will have a memorial service for their mother here in Shreveport on Saturday, April 27 at 3 p.m.

# It's Really Happening: I'm Leaving

At least for the summer.

As far as I know, Barbara and I will both be furloughed for the summer months, or at least I know that I will. (There is some discussion as to whether or not summer is the best time to furlough Barbara, since it's usually her vacation.) Budgetary constraints at the church are such that this was the Board's decision, and though another budget meeting is scheduled for May to determine if this drastic measure is still necessary, I haven't received word of any financial miracles and I realize we have to plan as if it's happening.

And by "we," I mean YOU.

You see, part of the work of summer is planning for summer, and if I'm not being paid to work in the summer, then we would not be in covenantal right relationship if I were to plan activities for the months I am not being paid. Therefore, I'm sending this same message via email and Messenger to a group of people who usually lead summer activities, and maybe you are one of those people, but I'm also looking for someone who hasn't led a summer activity before, but who might have an idea we haven't thought of yet. As many of you know, our summer Religious Education session is more relaxed and more activity-based than the classes during our regular church year.

Here is a partial list of things we've done in past years: The two yearly traditions are Tie Dye Sunday (usually the week after Affirmation Sunday, June 9th this year, and I believe Richard Denton will once again take point on that), and a Father's Day lunch the weekend after that (often a giant sub sandwich, occasionally something different to keep 'em guessing, usually led by Boogie and Rovena Windsor). For the rest of the summer (June 23- August 11) you will need to schedule someone to lead an activity each week, and at least one or two other adults to assist that person. Some that we've done in the past include various art and craft activities (fabric art such as blue glue batik, galaxy print t-shirts, or nature print t-shirts, art from recycled materials, various painting and drawing techniques); basic sewing; various science experiments and demonstrations, origami, duct tape wallets, yoga, creative writing, and drama games, just to name a few. It may be that you only need to plan these activities for Preschool 5th grade, as I may have activities lined up for middle and high school throughout the summer, but at printing time that is still not confirmed. If those MS/HS activities don't pan out, you may find that some activities are scalable in complexity and may lend themselves well to a "one room schoolhouse" approach with all ages (with adults and older children helping the little ones where needed), while others may be too complex for little ones or too boring for the older ones, in which case it's wise to come up with two different activities for that particular weekend.

Kevin Henry has volunteered to help make the schedule and to call people to remind them when they're up, but he will need some help. ..ideally, a team of help...to schedule presenters. We have a lot of supplies in the RE closets and cabinets, but anything you need to buy can be reimbursed out of the RE budget (talk to Jan Daczyk on Sundays), or you can turn in your receipt as a donation-in-kind.

Finally, I will need someone to coordinate with the nursery workers, and particularly, someone they can call when they need to be out so that a sub can be arranged. For example, Cameron will be out for a month from late May to late June for drill with his Army Reserve unit, so Kayla will need someone else to work with her during that time.

Am I happy about this turn of events? Not at all, but at the same time, I've never doubted YOU for a minute, or your capacity to build a team that will do great things for our children and youth this summer. After all, you've always come through when I've called, and I know you'll do the same for Kevin or any of your fellow congregants. I'm not going away right away, so I'll be around through May as a resource to help point you in the right direction for your planning, but the planning is all you. I look forward to hearing from you how you plan to help!


