I wish every single one of you and your families ample blessings with peace, joy, and ease throughout this holiday season. I love you all!!!



What is Christmas if We Don't Welcome the Stranger?



You're looking at one of my favorite images of Christmas, created by Haven Kimmel and shared widely online for several years now. At first glance, it is just a young couple, a young man and his pregnant wife, down on their luck, trying to catch a break. And yet, looking even a little closer reveals so many details to let you in on the story, if you weren't there already. You might notice the Star, and then the "No Vacancy" sign on the "Dave's City Motel," Looking a little more closely, you might notice they have a "New Man ger." Keep looking and you will find multiple such discoveries, small and large, but as I'm sure you already realize, this is more than just a clever modern reframing of an ancient story. On the contrary, the story itself is timeless, as current as it is ancient, and speaking a Capital T Truth that touches us on so many levels. This year, in particular, with desperate families being teargassed in our names at the border, and so many children still not reunited with their parents, we cannot help but see the irony of celebrating a story of a traveling couple who had no place to go to await the birth of their child, and then had to flee a genocide immediately after that child's birth in a stable.. More painful still is the

knowledge that that same child would grow up to speak up, always, for "the least of these," and that many who claim to live in his name see nothing wrong with our treatment of families at the border. If we honor and celebrate that story as a birth of Light and Hope in the world, how are we not called to respond as the forces of Light and Hope when the story plays out in our own time?

These times remind me of the poem by Adrienne Rich:

"My heart is moved by all I cannot save: so much has been destroyed I have to cast my lot with those who age after age, perversely, with no extraordinary power, reconstitute the world."

The Christmas story calls down to us through the ages, reminding us that for the sake of this child, and all children, we must indeed cast our lot with those ordinary souls who will reconstitute the world. But the story calls to our spirits, too, We can read it as a story of the spirit of Love waiting to be born in all of us. That spirit, by whatever name we know it, sustains us for the very work in the world that is ours to do. I have always been mystified by the false choice some would impose onto churches: social justice or spiritual growth? Either one without the other is a path to depletion and burnout or pointless navel-gazing. A full life needs a balance of both.
