FROM THE MINISTER

Think on What Covenant Means to You

Once a year, Unitarian Universalist ministers from

across a five-state area that was once known as the Southwest UU Conference (or the Southwest District), come together to study, reflect, fellowship, and retreat. At each of these gatherings, whoever is at that time the senior colleague, that is, the one who has the longest service in the "district," has a responsibility of reciting what is called "the discinline."

He or she explains that before there were districts of the UUA, before there was a UUA [and certainly before there were regions], the Unitarian and Universalist ministers in this part of the country made a pact with each other—a covenant.

Because congregations and ministers were so few and far apart, because they were each so far removed from other Unitarian and

Universalist resources, they agreed to be suphonor, even when it's difficult. port for each other. If a colleague asked for something, the answer was YES. For this reason, nothing was asked casually or without much consideration for the responsibilities already a part of the life of the other minister or lay leader. This was the discipline.

If a request was made, there was a genuine need for assistance. There was also confidence that colleagues would be there for each other.

The covenant was to say "yes." If there were any way at all to accommodate the request, "yes" was the answer.

The second part of the covenant recited is the agreement to meet a certain number of times every year so that each minister might have others to whom he or she is accountable. One gathering was just for colleagues, and the other obligations of the covenant were Summer Institute and Spring Conference. The covenantal bond has always been

For many years, Unitarian Universalism

thrived more so in the Southwest District than in any other part of the country, no doubt in large measure due to the commitment of its leadership to a covenant of healthy relationships and service.

Districts have now been dissolved and exchanged for regions. The covenant has been adapted to the pressures and demands of current times, but the discipline remains the same

To this day, when the discipline is recited or read, the ministers present get choked up. It stirs something so much a part of ministry that it touches everybody there.

> To this day, we are in earnest with one another, and take the asking and answering to heart. The spirit shared is palpable, the dauntlessness truly in-

Covenants gain their meaning and value from the honor and commitment of those who enter into them—commitment, even when it's inconvenient;

Like the Southwest Chapter of the UUMA, we at All Souls are a group organized around a covenant and a covenantal relationship.

We are a covenantal congregation.

We are a covenantal faith. Individually and collectively, we are accountable for the depth of heart and courage we bring to this relationship.

It is through our loyalty to covenant that our network of trust, respect, and honor gets its meaning.

I invite you to think on what covenant means to you, spiritually. The life of the spirit among us lives in the covenant. I can only imagine how vibrant this community could be if covenant came to mean as much to every one of us as it does to the ministers here. This is my hope, this is my dream, this is my prayer.






